#### **Garden Notes**

#### Japanese Garden Phase Two is in Progress

With completion last summer of the flagstone path leading to the Japanese Gate on 28<sup>th</sup> Avenue North, Phase One of the Japanese garden is primarily complete with appropriate planting, raked gravel dry ponds and waterfall, and a Japanese bridge. Phase One is an "entrance dry garden," with the majority of the Japanese Garden to be built on the North side of the entrance gate.

The Second Phase involves grading the site following the plan designed by Sadafumi Uchiyama, our Japanese Garden designer and builder from Portland Oregon. Once the earthwork is complete and groundcover takes hold, pathways will be built.

As part of the grading plan, the City of Fargo requires a permit process for a storm water mitigation plan including water holding ponds. The completed engineering mitigation plan has been approved by the City of Fargo and the Park District. Contractor proposals are being sought for the earthwork and grant proposals have been submitted to help fund this work.

There is a time limit on the City approval, so it is imperative that funds be secured in a timely manner so that Phase Two can begin this summer. A promotional brochure has been designed for the Society by the **Good For Nothing** Marketing team, who donated their time and talents, to help with this effort.

#### The Rest of the Gardens

The gardeners are eager to get busy with new garden plans! We have spent the winter months thinking up new ideas and searching for new plants to enhance the existing gardens.

**The Woodland Garden** will be a focus for renewal this season. Jim Walla has selected several interesting varieties of native shrubs and cultivars adapted to our area that will bring color in the form of early spring blooms or fall leaf color to this garden. Then wildflowers will be planted along the paths for both beauty throughout the seasons and a chance to learn about our native plants.

Lou Worner and Ruth Morton have designed a blue and yellow themed planting for the **Greenhouse** bed to honor Ukraine. New plants will also be added to the **pollinator beds** and to the **Rain Garden**.

Two stump benches that are decaying will be replaced with refurbished Park District benches and another patio set will be installed in the **Children's Garden** play area.

The statue of Alice (in Wonderland) that resided at the Atrium has been refurbished, along with the White Rabbit. These iconic figures will be placed in the letter A of the **Children's Garden**.

The base of the new stairs leading from the greenhouse patio will be enhanced with a small, central garden surrounding a large decorative pot. The vegetable garden will be used for cut flowers and herbs, with a balancing bed that will be used for dye plants. There will be many new things to see in the gardens this summer.
